English language and employment support for refugees from all backgrounds in the UK. This programme is completely free and delivered online.

All refugees living in the UK, including individuals who have been granted protection under the Immigration Rules, and those who arrived on one of the following schemes can apply to join the pilot:

Afghan Relocation and Assistance Policy (ARAP scheme)
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- Afghan Citizens Resettlement Scheme (ACRS scheme)
- Community Sponsorship Mandate Scheme
- Family Reunion
- UK Resettlement Scheme
- Vulnerable Persons Resettlement Scheme
- Granted Refugee status after claiming Asylum

STEP Ahead has opened for registration week commencing 14th October and is on track for teaching to start at the end of November. During the pilot, participants will receive 12-weeks employability support and 10-weeks of intensive digital ESOL lessons (3 times per week). Registration on STEP Ahead is voluntary, complementing existing English language and employment support services.

This is a different programme from the STEP Ahead programme above mentioned and is only available for Ukrainian migrants who arrived in the UK via the 3 government schemes. During the pilot, participants will receive 12-weeks employability support and 10-weeks of intensive digital ESOL lessons (5 times per week).

 Queen's University Pathway Opportunity Programme to your young people (going into year 13 or equivalent at college) – 2025/26 applications:

In the Pathway Programme, young people benefit from a structured series of events designed to aid progression to Queen's University Belfast including 6 one-day events, one session of self-paced coursework and a week-long summer school. Through this process they work within one of 13 Pathway subject areas, learning more about that subject and about university life in general.

Upon successful completion of the programme the young people will benefit from a **guaranteed conditional offer** or a **guaranteed interview** for a course at Queen's within their Pathway subject area. They may also be eligible for a **reduced offer** of up to two A-level grades (or equivalent) **below the standard entry offer to Queen's** (depending on performance on the programme and course selected). This along with a £1000 bursary, transition support and ongoing support while they are at Queen's.

The applications have opened online **Monday 30th September 2024**, and will close on **Friday 25th October 2024** at noon. After receipt of the application, a teacher at your young person's school/college, or member of your organisation (as nominated by the student) will be asked to complete a "technical" reference for the student, confirming information such as postcode, eligibility requirements and GCSE grades/A-Level subjects.

 The Belfast Met Student Funding Office has affiliated with Barclays to bring a funding opportunity to our FE students that have dependent children. Please see below a message from Barclays regarding this fund.

The Barclays Learning Grants programme addresses disadvantaged families' basic needs - giving them the space to think about their future, whilst also helping to unlock their potential through further education. This programme will help adults across the UK to begin their studies, as well as supporting existing students to continue and complete their studies.

Grants of up to £1,000 will be made to help individuals achieve their goals by funding the additional costs associated with education and training, up to £500 of any grant given may be allocated to basic household needs, dependent on household size.

Eligibility Criteria:

Eligible applicants must meet all the following criteria:

- 1. Have right of residence in the UK.
- 2. Be an adult with dependent children living with them (aged 18 or under).
- 3. Be in receipt of means tested benefits OR have household income of £30,000 or less.
- 4. Be a student currently studying on a course at an affiliated Further Education College (**Belfast Met**).
- Must be studying a <u>Level 2 (GCSE equivalent)</u> or <u>Level 3 (A Level equivalent)</u> course. Students studying courses higher or lower than these levels may not apply.
- 6. Be retraining following a period of unemployment OR pursing education/training with a view to future employment.

If you meet all the above criteria, please complete the following form (Barclays Interest List) (weblink) to inform us you would like to apply. Official applications are made via an interview with a Student Funding Officer - StudentFunding@belfastmet.ac.uk

Once we confirm that you meet all the above criteria via the info/evidence you supply in the above form we will then set an interview time and date for you to make an official application to Barclays Learning Grant. We will contact you via your **<u>student</u> <u>email account</u>** to set up an appointment.

 Belfast Met's Family Action Fund (Support for Asylum Seekers in <u>Further Education</u>)

Family Action Fund is a charity that can aid Asylum Seekers who are Parents and are studying in Further Education with a small grant of up to £250.

Please see Family Actions Educational Grant Criteria below.

Applicants must be both:

- an Asylum Seeker in receipt of an Application Registration Card (ARC).
- a parent/carer with legal responsibility for a child/children aged under 18 years old who live with you.

You can only apply using the above link via a Belfast Met's student account log in.

You can only apply once in a 12-month period, so if you received this support last year you will only be able to reapply if 12 months have passed since your last application.

Once you have completed this form a member of the Student Funding team will submit your application to Family Action, once Family Action have made a decision, they will notify Student Funding and we will then update you the applicant.

Please note: Due to limited funds this year, Family Action have confirmed that **they can only support a maximum of 30 students.** Applications will be assessed on a first come first serve basis using the criteria above and the 12-month rule. Once the Family Action quota of 30 has been reached the application will be closed.

Created in collaboration with user-led young peoples' organisations Revoke and Voice Collective, this project is the result of a series of workshops centering young people with lived experience of mental ill-health, distress or trauma, who have been failed and disempowered by safeguarding systems. Taking a trauma-informed, anti-oppressive approach, the guide shares and celebrates methods of fostering cultures of safety and care for young people that have been effective. The guide centres lived experience and young peoples' agency in offering principles for better practice, reflective questions and a practitioner's checklist to support organisational change.  E-visas information - In October last year we told you that the government are planning to get rid of all Biometric Residence Permits (BRPs) on 31st December 2024. Proof of immigration status moves online from 2025 onwards.

The Government is urging all those across the UK who use a physical immigration document to **take immediate action to transition to an eVisa**, as part of plans to digitise the UK border and immigration system. All visa holders who live in the UK and use a physical immigration document, such as a Biometric Residence Permit (BRP), to prove their rights are urged to take action now at <u>Get access to your eVisa:</u> Overview - GOV.UK (www.gov.uk) (weblink).

The four national grant funded bodies are today confirmed as **Migrant Help**, **Citizens Advice Scotland**, **the Welsh Refugee Council**, **and Advice NI**, which are all now offering immediate, free support for vulnerable individuals in their transition to an eVisa.

Square pegs, round holes: ESOL learners fitting into the FE context- Jeni Prettyman and Johnny Ingham

Adult ESOL programmes don't always fit neatly into the worlds within which they are taught. In our context, adult ESOL students' study in a Further Education college which predominantly provides courses for school leavers.

In many institutions ESOL teachers may be trained in teaching English as a foreign rather than a second/additional language, using materials designed for (monolingual) EFL students overseas, which do not fully meet the needs of our students. In an FE context, our part-time adult ESOL learners' needs also differ significantly from those NI ESOL Coordination

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of younger students on full-time vocational programmes across the college. Language and literacy levels (including digital literacy) can create barriers when trying to use college systems and processes, and ESOL teachers may experience difficulty and frustration shoehorning the needs of their learners into college paperwork expectations, not least due to the nature of language learning vs. vocational learning.

How can we change the landscape to ensure ESOL programmes and ESOL learners receive the tuition, recognition and support they deserve? How can we understand our students when language is a barrier? How can we help students develop their own voice?
